# **Sports Funding Report**

#### What is the Sports Premium?

The Government introduced the Sports Premium Grant in 2013. There is additional funding of £150 million per annum for the academic years 2013 – 2018 to improve the provision of PE and sport in primary Schools.

The initiative was launched following the Olympic Games with the aim of providing an enduring legacy, from which children would benefit for years to come. The original intention was to provide funding for 2 years. This has now been extended.

### How is the funding allocated?

The PE and sport allocation is funding provided to schools in addition to main the main school budget. The funding is ring fenced, and must be spent on the provision of PE and sports in schools.

The amount of funding we receive is based upon pupil numbers as recorded on the annual census in January. For the first year we received £1,290 and for the second year we received £8,000 plus £5 for every eligible pupil between the ages of 5 - 11.

#### **Our Aims:**

At Ashleworth C of E Primary School we aim to use the funding to:

- Enhance the quality of learning and teaching of PE
- Develop confidence of staff in the teaching of PE
- Ensure that all children enjoy PE and sport
- Improve health and well-being
- Increase competition and success in school sports
- Improve partnership work on physical education with other schools and other local partners
- Providing additional sporting opportunities through the use of targeted sessions delivered by qualified coaches
- Support and engage children through offering more sporting clubs

#### How do we use the money?

At Ashleworth C of E Primary School, we have long recognised the contribution of PE to the health and well-being of our children. We also acknowledge that a broad and balanced high-quality curriculum and extra-curricular activities have a positive impact on concentration, attitude and achievement. Pupils receive weekly PE lessons, delivered by well trained and enthusiastic teachers. The sports funding has enables us to provide the children with an

increased range of sporting opportunities and to significantly increase professional development for our teachers to ensure sustainable improvement in teacher confidence.

We have invested part of the funding in high quality coaching. Specialist coaching not only benefits the children by improving levels of progress in PE, but also ensures that the provision is fully inclusive, innovative and inspiring.

- Involvement in Newent sporting cluster
- Introducing after school sports clubs that change half termly
- Participation in Newent Swimming Gala
- Tag-Rugby and Football inter school completion

- Primary cross-country event at Newent
