



## Ashleworth C of E Primary School Statement of Behaviour Principles 2019

The Education and Inspections Act 2006 and DfE guidance (Behaviour in Schools 2012) requires that Governors make, and frequently review, a written **statement of general behaviour principles**. This is a statement of principles, not practice. This statement then guides the HeadTeacher in determining measures to promote good behaviour and thus enhance learning as laid out in the schools Behaviour Policy.

### Principles

- Every child has the right to learn, but no child has the right to disrupt the learning of others.
- Every child has the right to be listened to, to be valued, to be respected, to feel and be safe.
- Every child must be protected from disruption and abuse.
- Ashleworth CofE school is an inclusive school; all members of the school community should be free from discrimination, harassment, victimisation, and any other conduct that is prohibited by or under the Equality Act 2010.
- It is expected that all adults – staff, volunteers, governors, parents/carers – will set excellent examples of behaviour to the pupils at all times.
- Pupils are encouraged to develop a sense of personal responsibility for his/her own actions.
- This Statement and the schools Behaviour Policy will be published on the school website and should be understood by all pupils, parents/carers and staff.
- The school Behaviour Policy will ensure there are measures to encourage good behaviour, self-discipline and respect, and prevent all forms of bullying amongst pupils.
- The Behaviour Policy will set out how rewards, sanctions and reasonable force are to be used to ensure consistency by staff.
- Where there are concerns over a pupils behaviour, the school will work with parents/carers to ensure common strategies between home and school life.
- The school will seek advice and support from appropriate outside agencies where serious concerns arise over a pupils behaviour.
- The Behaviour Policy will set out the disciplinary action that will be taken against pupils showing unacceptable behaviour towards other pupils, staff, adults.
- The Behaviour Policy will clearly outline the schools approach to exclusions.
- The school will at all times fulfil its legal duties under the Equality Act 2010 in respect of safeguarding children with SEN and all vulnerable children.
- The school will keep up to date with the latest advice regarding the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974 and related regulations.

This Statement of Behaviour Principles is written and agreed by the Full Governing Body and will be reviewed regularly.
